This summer's exams seem a distant memory now but I am extremely proud of our students' achievements. I would like to congratulate all our students and their teachers on the College's excellent results which saw an overall pass rate of 98% and 49% of grades awarded at A*-B or D*-D. The achievements reflected in these A level and BTEC/UAL results are a testament to the commitment and resilience of our students, as well as the unwavering support from our exceptional staff and the wider college community. 385 students (83% of leavers) successfully landed a place at university. I wish all our leavers well as they progress on to their next destinations and look forward to hearing all about their future successes.

Essential 8 Awards

In the last week of term students' achievements were recognised at The Essential 8 Awards. Students were nominated by their teachers and Heads of House for demonstrating aptitude in one or more of the SFX Essential 8 skills: listening; speaking; problem solving; creativity; staying positive; aiming high; leadership; and teamwork. These particular skills have been chosen by the College as we believe them to be key transferable skills that will not only contribute to students' achievements while they are with us but will also stand them in good stead for life beyond the College. 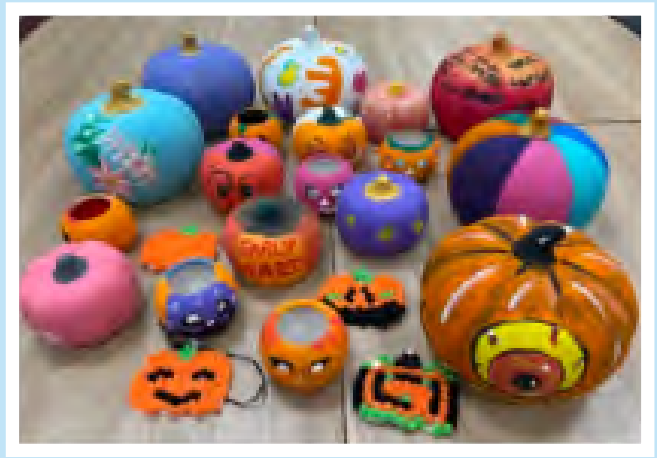

Careers and Progression

The Careers Department at the College offers guidance to students to assist them in making informed career decision, ensuring they transition successfully into university, apprenticeships or employment. As one group of students move on, preparations for the next begin. Earlier this term we hosted our annual UCAS Stop Day, giving Yr 13 students the chance to focus on completing their UCAS applications and solidifying their post-college plans. I'm pleased to report that most of those intending to apply through UCAS have finished and submitted their application forms. Those who haven't submitted yet should do so promptly to maximise their chances of receiving an offer for their preferred course at their chosen university. The Careers Department has also been supporting students applying for early entry courses, such as medicine, dentistry and veterinary science, as well as those aiming for Oxbridge. This year, 11 students have applied to Oxford and Cambridge, with three already receiving invitations to interview. I wish all our students the best with their applications. Additionally this term, the Careers team has organised a variety of speakers from a wide range of stakeholders including: HSBC; Lloyds; Amazing Apprenticeships; Investment 20/20; Savills; JP Morgan; Columbia Threadneedle Investments; British Airways.



City University, London recently hosted an insightful workshop for students interested in pursuing health-related degrees. This comprehensive session explored a variety of degree programmes, including nursing, occupational therapy, and other allied health professions. Students had the opportunity to engage with experienced faculty members and current students, gaining valuable insights into the curriculum, career prospects, and the practical experiences offered by each programme. 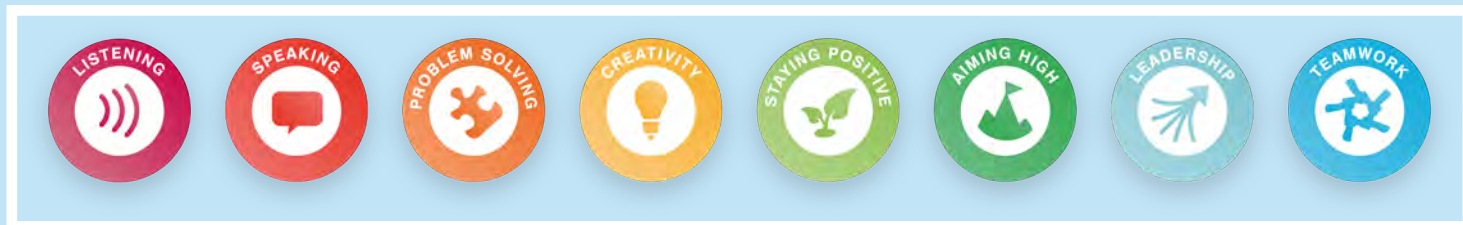

The Kalisher Trust plays a significant role in motivating and guiding young individuals to reach their full potential by honing their advocacy skills and participating in various programmes, ultimately assisting them in pursuing careers in the criminal bar. During their visit, the team shared their distinctive journeys into the legal profession and explored the diverse pathways available. This comprehensive programme is integrated into both the tutorial sessions and the broader academic curriculum. This term, our focus has been on the vital skills of speaking and listening. Students who showed significant progress in cultivating these skills were recognised with an Essential 8 certificate. Additionally, the Hebe Foundation played a crucial role in facilitating 'The Big Debate', an event that encouraged students from across the college to engage actively and refine their speaking and listening abilities by debating various pressing topics. This initiative not only bolstered their communication skills but also fostered critical thinking and confidence



T Level update

We currently offer four T Level programmes: Accounting, Education and Early Years, Management and Administration and our newest addition Media, Broadcast and Production. For those unfamiliar with T Levels, they are Level 3 qualifications that serve as an alternative to A Levels and BTECs. These qualifications equip students with the vocational and technical skills needed for their chosen career paths. Developed in collaboration with industry experts, T Levels are offered in various sectors including business, health and digital industries. A key component of the qualification is a 315 hrs (45 day) industrial placement, allowing students to apply classroom knowledge in real-world settings.

So far this term, students have been participating in a six-week "Ready for Work" programme led by the Hebe Foundation which has focused on confidence building, personal growth, mental health, public speaking and networking. Students have also heard from notable professionals such as Jenny Barber from Investment 20/20, Charles Awode from Sports Direct, and Mark Lancaster from GMax TrackStar.

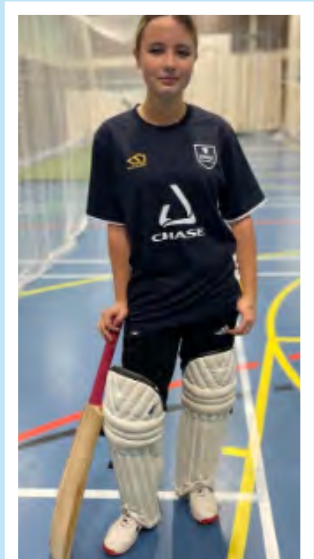

January Exams

Public Exams for BTEC/CTEC and the Maths Award in Number & Measure will take place from 6th January 2025. It is important that students prepare thoroughly for these exams; we are suggesting that, on average, students should be doing 2-3 hours of revision per day over the break. Students should check Dashboard for dates, times and locations of each examination. Morning exams commence promptly at 9am with breakfast available in the canteen from 8.30am. Afternoon exams commence at 1.30pm. Students are expected to arrive at least 30 minutes before the published start time for each examination. May I ask for parents' / carers' help in ensuring that students arrive to their exams in plenty of time. Thank you.

Up Learn

This is a reminder that all students following a STEM-related subject have access to Up Learn, an on-line platform that is designed to support students' independent study through interactive videos, AI adaptive learning and on-demand tutor support. All learning is underpinned by cognitive science and instructional theory which aligns to the work that the College has been doing with Rosenshine's Principles of Instruction. The Up Learn platform is best used to complement what students are learning in the classroom and with regular use, students are up to 2.2 times more likely to achieve an A or A* in their course of study. Currently, the platform is only available in the following A Level subjects: Mathematics, Economics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Psychology. All Yr 12 and Yr 13 students studying these courses have access to the platform and are expected to spend a minimum of 3 hours per week, per Up Learn course to fully optimise the platform's benefits. Once again, I ask that parents and carers encourage those students who have access to the platform to take up this fantastic opportunity to consolidate their learning and improve their outcomes.

Enrichment at St Francis Xavier

At St. Francis Xavier, our enrichment programme offers students a valuable opportunity to cultivate new interests, enhance their knowledge and skills, and boost their self-confidence by engaging in activities beyond their academic subjects. In today's competitive landscape, employers and universities alike, increasingly seek applications with a diverse set of transferable skills. According to the CBI, over 70% of employers prioritise employability skills in education. Through our extra-curricular activities, students develop essential skills such as independence, teamwork, communication, and problem-solving. These experiences "enrich" their educational journey, preparing them to be competitive applicants for apprenticeships, employment and university admissions. We wholeheartedly encourage all students to participate in the diverse activities we offer. This year alone, students have engaged in a wide array of pursuits including Young Enterprise, Culture cafe, Safe Space, Book Club, Theatre Club, Creative Writing, Model UN, Chess Club, Puzzle Club and Dram Productions. Additionally, our sports offerings include netball, table tennis, badminton, men's and women's football, men's and women's basketball, cricket and fitness activities. By participating in these enriching opportunities, students not only expand their horizons but also strengthen the skills that will serve them well in their future endeavours.

Vaping

We have seen an increase in the number of students vaping this term, both inside the college and in the local area. It is worth remembering that it is illegal to purchase or use a vape under the age of 18 and that the College has a strict policy on vaping. Anyone caught vaping on site will be dealt with in line with the College Code of Conduct and persistent offenders can expect to be temporarily excluded from the College. Please be aware that we reserve the right to confiscate vapes if students are caught in possession of them. .
