

# Chaplaincy News Letter January 2024

Chaplaincy has moved to a new room, we are now in Room 049, at the very centre of college life.





Chaplaincy is an integral part of College life at St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College. It provides our community with various opportunities to explore and deepen spiritual beliefs through voluntary prayer services, bible study, opportunities for charity work and attending residential retreats.

The chaplaincy base is a social space open to every member of the St Francis Xavier community. The base provides a safe space in which students can meet together, play games, discuss and debate issues that affect them. Working alongside the College Pastoral Team, Chaplaincy also helps to support individuals coping with the stresses of daily life and those faced with particular challenges such as bereavement, ill health and loss.

The college's Gospel choir rehearses in the base. Outreach work to older members of the local community is also a facet in the life of the college as is the charitable works that are undertaken.

### **House Names**

When the college was founded, the eight House Names chosen were of pilgrimage sites in England. Today our students come from a greater variety of backgrounds and cultures. The decision was made to reflect this in our houses, using the names of pilgrimage sites all over the world, therefore: -

St Albans became **Abijdan**, Canterbury became **Camino**, Durham became **Jerusalem**, Glastonbury became **Guadalupe**, Hereford became **Fatima**, Lincoln became **Lourdes**, York became **Knock** and we have retained **Walsingham** as a house name.





Each house has their own House Service in the chapel at one point in the year. Students contribute with readings prayers and sometimes singing.

When Camino House had their service, Mr Torras spoke of the two times he did that pilgrimage.

# **Charitable Works**

We started the year by joining many other schools and colleges in having a Macmillan Coffee Morning.



We raised a total of £110 selling everything at 50p.

There was a Rocky Road faceoff between two different types and one student's grandmother made a Jamaican Ginger and Rum Cake that proved particularly popular (in spite of no rum being evident).

Everything was sold in the twenty-minute morning break.

Ace of Clubs is a charity local to the college, they are based at Clapham Common. They exist to help rough sleepers and the local homeless. Just before Advent a group of students visited Ace of Clubs to see how we might best serve them in the run up to Christmas.

The following week we started our collection of contributions. This resulted in over thirty carrier bags full of donated items taken to them.
