# **Careers and Progression**

The Careers Department at the College provides advice and guidance to students to help them make informed decisions about their future career aims, and successfully progress into university, apprenticeship or employment.

On the week commencing 19th June, the College held its annual Careers Week. There was a whole host of progression activities with guest speakers from universities, employers and alumni. A few of the highlights included:

- Sarah Lewis, who shared her journey from school via university to her current role in Internal Communications at the YMCA with our Yr12 **Sociology** students;
- Our **Business** and **Engineering** students received a masterclass in hydrogen engineering and entrepreneurship from Charles Calvert of Vanguard Sustainable Transport Solutions;
- Alumnus Hendrix Famutimi, a registered social worker who is currently studying for his Psychotherapy Masters to qualify as a Clinical Psychologist, gave students of **Health & Social Care** invaluable insights into his experience in education and work;
- **Law** students heard from David Malone, Deputy Chief Crown Prosecutor and Patricia Deighton, a Crown Prosecutor, who both shared valuable insight on developing a career as a barrister:
- Criminology students heard from Detective Putt about his career journey into the Metropolitan Police;
- Jake Howard and Professor Ben Tippet from the University of Greenwich and the Royal Economic Society delivered an economics masterclass to **economics** and **business** students;
- Tayler Kirk from The Brokerage along with two of her interns shared some amazing oportunities for those from under-represented groups.





Our **maths** students were lucky enough to meet two amazing speakers during the Careers Week. Firstly, Alison Champernowne is a Data Analyst working for Avanade who analyses data to help businesses and organisations identify ways to better understand and improve their working practices. Alison talked about what her role entailed and its significance in all industries. She also gave very insightful advice about how skills gained during academic studies, such as problem solving, can support your future career without being directly related. The students then heard from Theodora Chen, a Digital Forensics Investigator working for the British Transport Police, who gave an engaging and informative talk on forensic investigation in the digital age. The talk included information on data storage, coding and encryption, the legal implications of cyber security and practical advice about how to keep your data safe. Students were even given the opportunity to work in hexadecimal and use ASCII to convert code. Thanks to Alison and Theodora for giving up your time and sharing so much valuable information with our students!



# **College Activities and Events**

Following months of hard work, including product development, presenting to leading industry experts and even learning to sew, our Young Enterprise students were crowned London and Kent champions in the Young Enterprise UK Company of the Year Awards! Their product, the Draft Dodger, is an ingenious and environmental solution to the current cost of living crisis. Draft Dodgers are handmade and individually sewn draught excluders made from recycled furnishing fabrics and filled with recycled mattress foam. After much deliberation, the judges announced that Byakuren and their Draft Dodgers were the winners of the Young Enterprise London and Kent Best Company Award! The team of entrepreneurs Daniel James-Proffitt, Anthony Banton, Gerald Peralta Bonilla, Denzel Brown and Amenhotep Cousins go by the name Byakuren, which is the Japanese word for White Lotus. Having won the tough round, the team progressed to the National final which was held online on 6th June. The team competed against eleven other schools, all winners of their respective regions, but alas the team were not placed in the top three. The winning team, Monito, hailed from Bromsgrove Independent School with a product which aimed to improve children's financial literacy. Despite not being placed, this was a tremendous achievement by Team Byakuren for whom an entrepreneurial future lies ahead, I'm sure!





Over the past couple of years, students and staff have been supporting the African Caribbean Leukaemia Trust (ACLT). In fact, you may recall that we won an SFCA Community Impact Award for the work last year. In recognition of our support, ACLT organised for our science students to visit the Blood Donor Centre at St. George's Trust. The students learned about the importance of blood donation and the need for more donors, especially from ethnic minority communities. They discussed different blood types, how blood is distributed through hospitals and the importance of providing patients with the best matched blood, especially those with sickle cell. The students were shown around the clinic and observed donors donating blood (including our very own Ms Hardy!). They even tested their own blood type and worked out the best blood match to themselves. For some of our students this charity is particularly pertinent as many know a family member or friend who suffers from sickle cell anaemia.





Our English Language and Literature students enjoyed a fun-filled day trip to Paris, home to many great writers such as Jean Paul Sartre, Victor Hugo and Jules Verne. During their visit, the students explored the city by boat and on foot and were fortunate to see many of the city's celebrated sites. These included the Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame Cathedral, the Centre Pompidou, La Place du Tertre, Montmartre before finishing with an amazing view of the Paris cityscape from the steps of the Sacre Coeur. What better view to get their creative writing juices flowing!

Here we have our Sports Science students, helping out with the organisation of Telferscot Primary School's Sports Day. 
During the final week of June the College celebrated 'Make a Difference week'. During the week, students and staff were asked to do one of three things:



#### **Enrichment at St Francis Xavier**

The enrichment programme at St Francis Xavier provides students with the opportunity to develop new interests, become more knowledgeable and skilled in an area, boost their self confidence and benefit from doing something away from the subjects they are studying. Increasingly, employers and universities say they are looking for applicants with a wide range of transferable skills; the CBI say that over 70% of employers want employability skills to be a top educational priority. Skills such as independence, team working, communication and problem solving are developed through these extra-curricular activities which "enrich" the student experience and make our young people competitive applicants as apprentices, employees and university undergraduates. We encourage all students to get involved with the activities on offer. This year, students have participated in a wide range of activities including:

- Young Enterprise; Culture Cafe; Safe Space (LGBTQ+ student group); Book Club; Theatre Club; Creative Writing; Model UN; Chess Club; Puzzle Club; Drama production.
- Sport: table tennis, badminton, men's/ women's football, men's/women's basketball; fitness

# **Cricket Academy**



An exciting addition to the curriculum from September 2023 will be the introduction of a Cricket Academy, run in partnership with Surrey County Cricket Club (SCCC) as part of their Sixth Form State School Cricket Programme. The programme will be available to students, both males and females, who have an interest in cricket and want to learn more about a career in the sport, as well as those that have a developing talent for cricket and who are looking to take their skills to the next level. Surrey County Cricket Club will provide all the equipment required to run the programme, including the installation of cricket nets in the sports hall.

The College is just one of three schools/colleges involved in the programme; the others being Lilian Baylis Technology College in Kennington and The George Abbot School in Guildford.

The programme will consist of four elements:

- an academic or vocational programme of study;
- 4 hours of professional cricket coaching per week;
- 2 hours of strength and conditioning training per week;
- Employability workshops and ECB coaching courses.



## T Level update

Our venture into the world of T Levels continues to be successful. Our business and administration students have now completed all of the required 315 hours of their Industry Placements across a range of industries including:

- East London NHS Foundation Trust
- CR8 Football
- Exceed Reading Stars (Education)
- JAGS Foundation
- Kindred (PR)
- Prince of Peckham (Hospitality)
- Reds10 (Construction)

Feedback from employers has been incredibly positive with students putting what they have learned in the classroom into practice as well as developing their business etiquette. Some students have already presented a T Level marketing strategy to senior executives, including the CEO at Reds10. Students undertaking their placement at the NHS East London Foundation Trust attended the SFX Careers Fair as NHS ambassadors which was a great advertisement for T Levels, more generally.

We are looking forward to launching two new T Levels from September in Accounting & Education and Childcare. Both courses will be delivered in fully refurbished learning spaces that even includes a practice nursery for the Childcare course. Our aim is that those students following T Level programmes will be better prepared for the workplace than their non T Level counterparts, and therefore be much more competitive in the labour marketplace.









## Yr11 Applicants - Experience Day

Over 400 applicants with conditional offers enjoyed a fun-packed morning experiencing a day in the life of a student at Saint Francis Xavier at our Experience Day on 30 June. Our prospective students had a welcome from the Principal, followed by three interactive curriculum taster sessions. The day ended in the canteen and quad where the new students got to know the teachers and their fellow sixth form college students - along with a free ice cream and other goodies! We wish everyone a fantastic summer and best of luck for 24th August when you receive your GCSE results.





#### What happens next for our Year 11 applicants between now and September?

Once you receive your GCSE results on 24th August, you will be invited into the College to finalise your study programme and enrol you into the College.

This year, enrolment will begin on Friday 25th August and goes through to Friday 1st September. You will receive a letter over the summer, about which enrolment day you should attend. On your enrolment day, our student ambassadors will be there to guide you to the Sports Hall, where you will meet with a tutor to agree your programme of study.

You will need to bring your exam result slips, a copy of your enrolment invite, and an appropriate form of ID (passport or birth certificate) with you.

#### What do I do if I can't make the enrolment day?

It is vital that you make every effort to attend your enrolment day as it forms the basis for a successful start to your time at college. In exceptional circumstances, it may be possible to make alternative arrangements. If this is the case, it is essential that you contact the Admissions Team at the College, prior to your enrolment appointment.

#### Can I bring my parent/carer with me?

Parent/carers are welcome to attend enrolment with you. Equally, it is perfectly acceptable for you to attend alone should you choose to do so. Our student ambassadors will be on hand to support you through the process.
