THE ENROLMENT PROCESS EXPLAINED



STEP ONE

Upload your results from home

1

Once you receive your results, we will ask you to log into the 'Already registered' section at <https://prospect.sfx.ac.uk/> and select 'Evidence'. There you will be asked to upload a photograph or PDF of your results and passport or birth certificate. Uploading both these documents will speed up the enrolment process at your appointment.



STEP TWO

Arrival & Welcome

2

You will be invited in on a specific day between **20th - 26th August**. We will start the enrolment process by double checking your enrolment letter and your application status on our system.



STEP THREE

Student ID photo taken

3

We will be taking the photo that will be on your student ID card for the year. Your student ID card is used to tap in and out of college and worn whenever you are on-site, so make sure to smile!



STEP FOUR

Document check

4

We will double check that there are no problems with the documents you uploaded prior to your appointment. If there are any issues we may need to see them again or re-scan them, so we ask you to bring them along just in case. If you were not able to upload them prior to your appointment we can scan them in at this point.



STEP FIVE

Course counselling

5

You will discuss your subjects / courses of interest with one of our teachers. The teacher will check that you meet the entry requirements of those courses and add you on to the course or discuss alternate options with you. During this process we will also check whether you are eligible to receive free college meals.



STEP SIX

Confirmation of enrolment

6

A member of our senior staff team will finalise your enrolment, making sure that you have been put on the best course we can offer you and that you are happy with your selection.

Congratulations, your enrolment is confirmed and you are officially a student of St. Francis Xavier Sixth Form College! You will return on Wednesday 2nd September for your induction day.

UNDERSTANDING YOUR COURSE

A Levels / Applied Diplomas

TWO YEAR COURSE

FULL-TIME STUDY

Take a combination of 3 subjects (*4 with exceptional GCSE results/a fluent second language*)

There are over 30 A Level/Applied Diploma subject options

Our 3 Applied Diploma subjects (Criminology, Law and Psychology) are equal to one A Level and each can be taken with two other subjects

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:

Entry requirement of 6 GCSEs graded 4 or above, preferably including Maths & English Language (*many subjects require grade 5s*) See our website for subject-specific requirements

GRADING

A Levels: Final grades mainly based on exams completed at the end of the two year course, although there may be some coursework units

Applied Diplomas: Final grades mainly based on coursework completed throughout the two year units

Highest possible grade of 3 A* = 168 UCAS points

PROGRESSION

The majority of our A Level students progress to university



Extended Diplomas

TWO YEAR COURSE

FULL-TIME STUDY

There are 11 Level 3 Extended Diploma courses

Study 1 subject in-depth

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:

Entry requirement of 5 GCSEs graded 4 or above, ideally including English Language / BTEC Level 2 Extended Certificate (*Merit or above*) See our website for subject-specific requirements

GRADING

Final grades mainly based on coursework completed throughout the two year course, although there may be some exam-assessed units

Highest possible grade of BTEC Triple Distinction or UAL Distinction = 168 UCAS points

PROGRESSION

The majority of our Extended Diploma students progress to university

The structure of the course also makes it a great route into a Level 4 apprenticeship or employment



If you don't qualify for a level 3 course this year you will be able to take a one-year, full-time Level 2 transition course while studying the Maths and English Language GCSEs if needed. We offer Level 2 courses in Business, Health & Social Care, Media Studies and IT. You will then be able to move onto a Level 3 course next year as long as you achieve a Merit or above at Level 2.

T LEVELS

TWO YEAR COURSE

FULL-TIME STUDY

Study 1 subject in-depth
(equivalent to 3 A levels)

There are 4 T Levels

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:

Entry requirements of 5 GCSEs graded 4 or above, including Maths and English language at grade 5. 80% of the course is classroom based and 20% (*at least 45 days*) is spent in an industry work placement

GRADING

Final grade based on a combination of exams, and employer-set project and practical assessment/coursework.

Highest possible grade of Distinction = 168 UCAS points

PROGRESSION

T Levels are an excellent route for progression into employment, apprenticeships and higher education



ENROLMENT FAQS

CAN I CHANGE MY MIND ABOUT THE COURSE(S) I'VE APPLIED FOR?

Yes, you will finalise the courses you would like to study when you enrol. These can be different to those on your application form if you have changed your mind. During the enrolment process you will meet with a course counsellor who will discuss which courses would be best for you based on your GCSE results, interests and your future career plans.

WHAT DO I NEED TO BRING WITH ME TO ENROLMENT?

You will need to upload your GCSE results and ID online prior to your appointment. When you attend enrolment, you should bring your GCSE results, proof of identification and your enrolment appointment letter. Don't worry if you have a problem uploading them; we can scan them in at enrolment.

I CAN'T MAKE MY ENROLMENT APPOINTMENT. WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Enrolment should be your priority over other arrangements. If you have a genuine reason that means you cannot attend your appointment, and you can attend another day during the enrolment week (**Thursday 20th - Wednesday 26th August**), please email admissions@sfx.ac.uk with your availability and we will see if it is possible to move your appointment. If you are away for the whole of the enrolment week we recommend you ask a trusted family member or friend to attend in your place. You will need to upload your results and ID to the online enrolment system ahead of your appointment and your family member/friend will need to have a clear idea of what courses you are hoping to enrol onto. If you do not have someone that can attend in your place, please contact us. Please be aware we are not able to reserve places and cannot guarantee there will be places remaining once enrolment week has ended. Please note we will not be able to enrol students who are not able to attend lessons for an extended period at the beginning of term due to being out of the country. Instead we would ask you to come and see us as soon as you are able to, but we cannot guarantee a place will be available. Please contact us if you have any concerns.

WHAT HAPPENS IF MY GCSE RESULTS DON'T MEET THE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR MY CHOSEN COURSE(S)?

Students with results close to the entry requirements will still be considered for the course. We will look at your overall results to make our final decision. We will do our best to accommodate everyone who has received a conditional offer, even if they have not met the entry requirements for their chosen course, and will find a suitable alternative course for you. It is important to attend your enrolment appointment to see what we can offer you.

CAN I CHANGE A SUBJECT ONCE THE YEAR HAS BEGAN?

It is possible in some cases to change a subject or course early in the autumn term. This is dependent on whether there are spaces available on the subject you want to move to and how much work has been missed so far. You will be expected to catch up on any missed work in your own time. We strongly advise you to make sure the subjects you pick at enrolment are right for you, as any missed lessons could mean falling behind, and there is no guarantee you will be able to change.

DO I NEED TO ATTEND ENROLMENT WITH MY PARENT/GUARDIAN?

Your parent/guardian is very welcome to attend, but it will not be a problem if they cannot attend. We do ask you to limit family members to two people.

I AM FLUENT IN A DIFFERENT LANGUAGE. CAN I TAKE THIS AS A FOURTH A LEVEL?

Students fluent in French, Spanish, Italian or Portuguese can take the language as a fourth A level or in addition to their BTEC/UAL course. You will need to attend timetabled lessons for the language. Students who do not have a GCSE qualification in the language will need to first be assessed by the subject teacher. Students who are fluent in a language not offered among our A level subjects are welcome to apply to be entered for the A level exam.

CAN I APPLY FOR A BURSARY AND WILL I RECEIVE FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

Information on applying for a 16-19 bursary will be available at the induction day after enrolment. Those who qualify will need to have their own bank account for the bursary payments to be paid into, and not their parent/carers account. The bursary will be dependent on attendance and punctuality.

Visit www.gov.uk/1619-bursary-fund to see if you are eligible to receive a bursary. If you received free school meals at school it is highly likely you will receive free college meals.

CAN I TAKE FOUR A LEVELS?

Students with exceptional GCSE results will be offered the opportunity to take four A levels. In this situation we often recommend considering the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), which is equal to half an A level. It is a coursework based project on a topic of your choice that you complete during the first year and is highly valued by universities. Students qualifying for four A levels may also be considering applying to Oxbridge or Russell Group universities - See the Aiming High programme on page 10.

CAN I TAKE A BTEC WITH AN A LEVEL?

The majority of our BTEC subjects and all of our UAL subjects are Extended Diplomas. These are full-time courses equal to 3 A levels. For this reason they are not taken with any additional A level subjects. We also offer Applied Diplomas in Criminology, Applied Psychology and Law. These are equivalent to one A level, and are taken with 2 other A level or Applied Diploma subjects.

WHEN WILL I HAVE MY TIMETABLE?

You will receive a provisional timetable at your induction session on **Wednesday 2nd September** after you have enrolled. You will be able to access your timetable online. Be aware there may be some minor changes or additional lessons added in the first few weeks of term.

OXBRIDGE SUPPORT

For students interested in applying to Oxford or Cambridge, we have a range of support to help with the decision-making and application. We have established a strong relationship with both Jesus College, Oxford and Robinson College, Cambridge and throughout the year we have talks from and workshops from each university covering aspects such as course and college choice, the application process, super-curricular advice and preparation for entry assessments and interviews. In addition, each year we take prospective students on visits to both universities, so that they can make an informed decision as to which one would be right for them.

EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION (EPQ)

The EPQ is a highly valued and respected course which is designed to enhance the student's ability to work independently through the development and utilisation of a series of academic skills, all of which are beneficial to future study and employment. For those looking to apply for university, this course provides excellent preparation for the kind of study required at degree level. The EPQ is particularly beneficial for those applying to Oxbridge and other highly competitive universities.



STUDENT ENRICHMENT AND EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

OUR STUDENTS ANSWER YOUR QUESTIONS

WHAT IS YOUR TIMETABLE LIKE? DO YOU HAVE TO GO IN EVERYDAY?

The timetable is different to GCSEs and depends on the courses you study, but generally you'll be in college most days. On my course, I had a free day on Tuesdays, when I could study. I attended college from 9am to 4pm Monday and Thursday, and Wednesday and Friday were shorter days.

HOW GOOD ARE THE TEACHERS?

The teachers are really good, they always try to make sure you understand what you are doing and they give you a lot of resources to help with your studies. They respond pretty quickly to their emails which is amazing for anyone that has a lot of questions like me.

I would say that the teachers are excellent. They all provide a great support system and your tutor is there to help with any issues. You can always visit your teachers during their office hours to raise concerns and you can also email anytime. They're friendly and great to work with.

WHAT EQUIPMENT DO YOU NEED TO BRING WITH YOU WHEN YOU FIRST START?

I bring a pen and a notebook and if I'm doing maths, I bring pencils, rubbers and a ruler. If I'm not sure of something in maths I write in pencil so I can correct my mistakes after in pen.

You'll typically need a well-stocked pencil case: arm yourself with your favourite pens, pencils, rulers, rubbers, highlighters. Bring paper and a good notebook too, although some teachers provide you with exercise books.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO SOMEONE WHO PLANS TO STUDY 3 STEM (SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING & MATHS) SUBJECTS?

If STEM subjects are what you want to study, then go for it. Make sure you work hard and don't get distracted as it's important to pay attention. If you do need help make sure you ask. If you end up taking a STEM subject it would be good to do some extra studying at home after your lessons, especially topics you find tricky so the information can stick in your head.

WHAT ARE THE BEST EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES?

There's an excellent gym and plenty of sport clubs to choose from (football, basketball, athletics etc) and lots of interesting clubs such as Debating, Hidden Histories, Student Union, etc. They're all really interesting and open to anyone.

HOW DO YOU PREPARE FOR LIFE AFTER COLLEGE? DO YOU GET HELP WITH THIS?

In preparation for life after college your form teacher and subject teachers will give you tips on the right websites to sign up to e.g. UNIFROG, and assistance with CVs and anything related to life after SFX. You will receive talks from the careers advisor, along with the chance to meet different universities at the College's Higher Education Fair. Even if you decide not to go to uni, your teachers will still help you with what you plan to do after college. There are workshops available to attend to help with preparing for the next year and the weekly college bulletin informs you of the latest placement, work experience, apprenticeship and job opportunities.

ARE THE WAY LESSONS TAUGHT SIMILAR TO SECONDARY SCHOOL?

The teachers assess more often than in secondary e.g. mini assessments, practise questions on certain topics and every few weeks teachers have a one to one with you to review your work and set targets.

I found that the lessons are smaller and more interactive - there is more emphasis on making your own notes and expect to have homework from every lesson for the next lesson, you'll find a good routine soon.

WHAT IS LIFE LIKE AT ST. FRANCIS XAVIER SIXTH FORM COLLEGE?

Life at SFX is fairly different to school in that there are so many people your own age. The teachers are friendly and very interactive, there's plenty of interesting clubs to get involved with (I'm in Student Union and Hidden History) and the library is also excellent. It's really easy to fit in as the classes aren't too large and you'll make friends quickly.

WHAT IS THE DRESS CODE, WHAT SORT OF THINGS DO STUDENTS USUALLY WEAR?

The dress code isn't a concern, you're allowed dyed hair and your own fun style as long as it's not too revealing or has any inappropriate messages. I prefer just jeans and tops myself to keep it comfortable - there's no pressure to dress up.

In year 12 everyone studies Religion and Philosophy where you discuss different topics in the world and different religions. For example, in my class we were discussing LGBTQ+ issues, how different religions pray, and their rules in their holy books.

HOW LONG ARE THE FACILITIES OPEN AFTER LESSONS END?

The library is usually open before, during and after lessons. There is also the gym that is open for about an hour after College finishes. Sometimes your teachers are free that time of the day and they can assist you with any work you have or you can sit in their classroom to complete any work instead of going to the library. Teachers also arrange for university students to come in and help students after lessons end.

MAY

HOW LONG DO WE HAVE FOR LUNCH? IS LUNCH THE ONLY BREAK IN THE DAY?

There are two different lunch times: 12:20 and 13:10, depending on what your timetable looks like. You can leave college at these times to get food if you wish, but the college cafeteria is also pretty great; different food options every day, hot and cold, and my personal favourite addition, the college Costa coffee shop. A hot chocolate in the afternoon makes all the difference. There's also a break at 11am. There are lots of places inside and outside to eat and sit for lunch/break.
